## CITY NEWS

On November 2, 2021, Dodge City voters will have an opportunity to consider a one-half-cent, or 0.5%, retail sales tax increase dedicated to transportation improvements, including the rehabilitation, construction and reconstruction of streets, sidewalks, curbs, gutters, trails, transit facilities, bicycle lanes, traffic signalization, signage, landscaping along rights-of-way, and all related improvements. The sales tax increase is proposed to be in effect for 10 years. Over the past few years, public input has told us that the residents, business owners and visitors want to see more work done on our streets. If the voters approve the proposed increase, more street work can begin in 2022. City Manager Nick Hernandez recently presented to at the United Way Leaders Luncheon and the Dodge City Economic Outlook Conference. Information presented included updates on Census data, employment, Hilmar Cheese, housing and construction, property tax, the proposed Street Sales Tax, and the Downtown Streetscape.

## DEPARTMENT UPDATES

Dodge City Regional Airport applied for a grant to help with the terminal remodel and addition cost. Our community and region are currently served with a 50-passenger jet; although the terminal has space for 36 passengers in the holding room, and the lobby area only holds 28 passengers. Several community businesses, non-profits and surrounding communities wrote letters of support for this project, and city staff wanted to thank those businesses and communities who were able to provide letters. Staff expects to have a response on the grant by January 2022.

The Parks and Facilities staff worked at Hennessy Hall as they cleared out and prepped rooms for contractors to make building upgrades. Old radiators and concrete curbs were removed in room 15 and the west ground floor restrooms to maximize the spaces, and contractors installed new carpet in room 40 for the future KansasWorks office space.



Parks and Facilities staff has continued winterizing buildings and grounds as they have blown out all the waterlines to the pools at Long Branch Lagoon and the irrigation systems in the parks. Crews have also been applying herbicide for annual winter weeds, aerating turf grass and applying fall fertilizer throughout town.

## PROJECT UPDATES

**Downtown Streetscape:** Building Solutions was selected as the Construction Manager at Risk for the Downtown Streetscape project following a competitive bid process. Currently, City staff is working on an Economic Development Grant for Tourism to provide additional funding for the project. Construction is anticipated to begin at the beginning of March and be completed by the end of March in 2024. The City released a request for qualifications (RFQ) for the design of a Childcare facility. The purpose of this request is to solicit and select a firm to provide professional architectural design services and work with City staff and project partners to develop plans for a new Child Care Facility. Previously, the Dodge City/Ford County Development Corporation formed a childcare committee in January 2020 due to the extreme lack of childcare in the community. In addition to the committee of various stakeholders, a partnership has been formed with the City of Dodge City, USD 443 Bright Beginnings, the YMCA, the Rural Education and Workforce Alliance (REWA) and Dodge City Community College to open a new childcare center. 

# PROPOSED STREET SALES TAX FAST FACTS

On November 2, 2021, Dodge City voters will have an opportunity to consider a one-half-cent, retail sales tax increase dedicated to transportation projects, including the rehabilitation, construction and reconstruction of streets, sidewalks, curbs, trails, transit facilities, landscaping along rights-of-way, and all related improvements. The sales tax increase is proposed to be in effect for 10 years.

## WHY NOW?

Over the last few years, our residents, business owners and visitors continue to tell us that more work on our streets is needed. Now the voters of Dodge City have the opportunity to decide how much money they would like dedicated to streets. If the proposed increase is passed, the City will be able to commit \$4.6 million more per year for street improvements beginning in 2022.

## FINANCIAL IMPACT

If approved, the sales tax rate would change from 8.65% to 9%. The .35% total increase reflects the Horsethief Reservoir Sales Tax of .15% expiring at the end of 2021 and the new proposed 0.5% Street Sales Tax taking effect in April 2022.

**This equates to an extra 35 cents in sales tax for every \$100 spent.**

## WHAT FUNDS STREETS NOW?

Currently, the street maintenance budget for residential streets ranges from approximately \$300,000-\$500,000 per year.

An additional \$1-\$1.5 million of debt is issued for City/Highway modernization and expansion projects.

## WHAT IF IT DOESN'T PASS?

If the proposed sales tax does not pass, we will continue to focus our current resources on the basic infrastructure items as we have in the past. However, certain community needs cannot be met and will have to be deferred well into the future. The City Commission and Staff have worked hard to lower property tax\* by just over 7 mills since 2013 and strive to either lower it more or keep it steady with each budget moving forward.

\*25 - 30% of sales tax proceeds come from non-residents.



## AAA Kansas Honors Dodge City Police Sergeant with 2021 DRE of the Year Award

WICHITA, Kan. – Oct. 19, 2021 – AAA Kansas today presented a law enforcement officer from Dodge City Police Department with a statewide award for his efforts to prevent impaired driving on our roadways.

Sgt. Thad Brown with Dodge City PD received the AAA Kansas 2021 Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) of the Year award in front of about 150 law enforcement officers and city and county prosecutors attending the 16<sup>th</sup> Annual Kansas Impaired Driving Conference in Wichita.

“Because safe roads are important to AAA, we have, over the years, been a strong supporter of law enforcement efforts to fight impaired driving,” said Shawn Steward, manager of Public and Government Affairs for AAA Kansas. “It is with this same commitment that we initiated the AAA Kansas ‘Drug Recognition Expert of the Year’ Award three years ago. We thank and congratulate Sgt. Brown for his tireless efforts, over more than 15 years, to help keep impaired drivers off the streets. His work has truly made a difference.”

A drug recognition expert is a law enforcement officer trained to recognize impairment in drivers under the influence of drugs other than, or in addition to, alcohol. The International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) coordinates the International Drug Evaluation and Classification (DEC) Program with support from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) of the U.S. Department of Transportation. In addition to officers, who are certified as DREs, the DEC Program educates prosecutors and toxicologists on the DRE process and the drug categories.

“In addition to his outstanding work in removing impaired drivers from our roadways,” AAA Kansas’ Steward continued, “Sgt. Brown has consistently been a very available and involved DRE instructor, helping other officers across Southwest Kansas maintain not only their DRE certification, but their SFST (Standardized Field Sobriety Testing) and ARIDE (Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement) training as well. Sgt. Brown also regularly arranges DUI check lanes, which are always successful in combatting impaired driving across the region.”

As a part of this award, in addition to presenting Sgt. Brown with an award plaque, AAA Kansas will be sponsoring and providing funding for Sgt. Brown to attend the 2022 IACP National Drug and Alcohol Impaired Driving Conference.
