1. Out of the utmost care and concern for our community and in an abundance of public caution, the City of Dodge City closed its facilities to public access on Tuesday, March 17, as one of several proactive steps to combat and limit the spread of the COVID-19 pandemic locally. We remain fully operational; we are merely providing our services in a different fashion. As of the release of this newsletter, there is no confirmed community spread of the coronavirus disease within our county. However, there has been one confirmed case of an individual who traveled into the community. For a full release regarding the closure of public facilities, the Kansas Department of Health and Environment's recommendations regarding who and when to quarantine, and information on the steps you can take to protect yourself from the spread of germs, continue scrolling. We also encourage everyone to follow us on Facebook at [www.facebook.com/cityofdodgecity](http://www.facebook.com/cityofdodgecity) and check our website, [www.dodgecity.org](http://www.dodgecity.org), as this situation is ever-evolving, and we are doing our best to share up to date information. We appreciate the community's patience and understanding as we work through these trying times.
2. City parks remain open at this time and are essential resources for health and wellness during the COVID-19 outbreak while maintaining social distancing and abiding by Gov. Kelly's executive order 20-04, to limit social gathering to 50 people or less. Sports complexes and Mariah Hills Golf Course Pro Shop are the exception to this and are closed to public access. Please see the attached release from the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) regarding their support of parks and open spaces and recommendations on how to use these spaces during this time.
3. During this ongoing period, we are encouraging customers to pay their utility bills online, through the dropbox located on the north side of City Hall, over the phone, or by mail. For online payments, go to <https://www.dodgecity.org/678/Pay>, select the online payment category you need, and follow the instructions to set up payments, for questions, call the billing office at 620-225-8111.
4. Municipal Court is providing continuances for all hearings at this time and rescheduling them for a date in May. The court staff is mailing a notice of hearing to each person with their new date. The public may call them at 620-225-8107 or email the court with any questions about their case at [court@dodgecity.org](mailto:court@dodgecity.org). The email would need to include the individual's name and date of birth. The following payment options are available: over the phone at 620-225-8107, online at <https://www.dodgecity.org/678/Pay>, or use the dropbox on the north side of City Hall.
5. On behalf of the Dodge City Complete Count Committee, we are asking for your help to achieve a complete count in Dodge City and Ford County in the 2020 Census Count. By now, most homes in Dodge City and Ford County should have received the 2020 Census invitation. The 2020 Census can be done online, phone or mail. It's available in 13 different languages, and it's easy to complete. Just follow the instructions in your invitation.
6. CREW recycling is closed to public access but employees will work regular hours 8-5 Monday through Friday and 9-2 on Saturday. You can still leave your recyclables at 716 E Military or at the Civic Center. Employees are following city protocol at this time to minimize social contact so they will not be able to assist customers in unloading during this time. Thank you for your patience.

7. Kansas Department of Transportation crews will be replacing the beam on the Marshall Road bridge over U.S. 400 in Ford County on Wednesday and Thursday, March 23-24. The U.S. 400/ Dodge City bypass will close from U.S. 50 to U.S. 56, and the Marshall Road bridge over U.S. 400 will be reduced to one lane with traffic controlled by flaggers during the replacement. Motorists are encouraged to use an alternate route during the replacement. Message boards have been placed to warn travelers of the need to find an alternative route.
8. Conant Construction continues to make progress on the Hennessey Hall Projects:  
KLETC Progress—The electrical is 90% complete, waiting on the panel to come in so it can be installed. The walls are getting drywall hung, and mud/tape/texture will start early next week. The flooring and blinds are in and waiting for installation. The HVAC system is close to being finished as well. Despite the engineering delay, things are progressing quickly, and are working on getting back on track to try and finish as close as possible to the original completion date.  
REWA Progress—The walls have been patched, and painting will start the first of next week. Most of the electrical is also complete. The HVAC systems have come in, and the subcontractor will begin installing them today (3/20). The floor cleaning/polishing is being scheduled as well. As long as there are no delays due to the current events, this job should also catch up reasonably quickly despite engineering delays.
9. Recently, the Friends of Wright Park Zoo and the City of Dodge City hosted a fundraising strategy session for the public to come and learn about how they can help "Redo the Zoo." There were also opportunities to sign up to become a Friends of the Zoo member and to learn about the Wright Park Zoo Master Plan. 10. United States Citizenship and Mobile Services that were scheduled to be in Dodge City on March 23-26, 2020, have been canceled due to the COVID-19 concerns. For those citizens with interviews or biometric appointments, please call USCIS, National Customer Contact Center at 1-800-375-5283 to reschedule your appointment.
11. The Long Branch Lagoon is currently offering the buy 3 get one free season pass sale now through March 31. Passes are available at [lagoon.com](http://lagoon.com) or by calling (620) 225-8156.
12. Central Ave. pavement striping is scheduled for Thursday, March 26, and Friday, March 25. Continue to watch the message boards for driving instructions and for the first notification of when two-way traffic begins. We also encourage you to follow our social media pages and website for updates.

City closing public facilities in response to coronavirus

DODGE CITY, Kansas — Out of the utmost care and concern for our community and in an abundance of public caution, the City of Dodge City is taking several proactive steps to combat and limit the spread of the coronavirus pandemic locally. The following information is being updated continuously and re-evaluated.

Effective March 17, 2020, the following City facilities will be closed to the public, but employees are working and available by phone for questions:

- Animal Shelter - 620-225-1567;
- City Hall/Municipal Court - 620-225-8100 and 620-225-8107;
- CREW Recycling - 620-225-8148 (drop-off only, elderly and disabled by appointment only);
- Dodge City Convention & Visitors Bureau Center - 225-8186 ;
- Hennessey Hall - call the parks department at 620-225-8160;
- Mariah Hills Golf Course - 620-225-8182;
- Santa Fe Depot – CVB Offices - 620-225-8218/Economic Development Office - 620-227-9501/Chamber of Commerce Office 620-227-3119/ and Public Transit Offices - 877-323-3626 or 620-225-8119 ;
- Wright Park Zoo - call the parks department at 620-225-8160;
- Why Not Dodge Facilities including Dodge City Raceway Park, Athletic Complex Facilities, and United Wireless Arena - Call City Hall at 620-225-8100
- Utility Billing - 620-225-8111

No City parks are being closed at this time. Though following Gov. Kelly's executive order, there shall be no gatherings over 50 people.

This may be re-evaluated if additional positive COVID-19 cases are reported in Ford County, however. As of the release of this statement, Ford County officials have confirmed one positive case within the county and have stated that the individual is in quarantine. Please refer to [fordcounty.net](http://fordcounty.net) for more information regarding this case.

"These closures are to protect the most vulnerable members of our community and preserve access to key backup facilities in the case of an emergency shelter need," said City Manager Cherise Tieben. We are sorry for any inconvenience that this may cause and hope these closures are temporary."

"An overabundance of caution is vital at this point. We would rather do too much and in the end not know if it was necessary, rather than do too little, and the effects be abundantly apparent."

All non-essential City board meetings will be canceled or rescheduled. More specific information will be released at a later time.

### **City Facility Closures**

The Hoover Pavilion and Mariah Hills Golf Course Meeting Room will be unavailable for rental until further notice during this outbreak period. Full refunds will be offered to any party with a canceled reservation.

Athletic uses are canceled until further notice at Athletic Facility Complexes and events will be postponed or possibly canceled at Dodge City Raceway Park and United Wireless Arena.

### **Utility Bill Payment**

During this ongoing period, we are encouraging customers to pay their utility bill online, through the dropbox located on the north side of City Hall, over the phone, or by mail. ### **Municipal Court Cases**

At this time the municipal judge is preparing guidelines and directives for pending appearance dates, trials, and probation check-ins. These guidelines and directives will severely limit any personal contacts with the court and court personnel while also protecting the rights of all citizens to have their matters fully and fairly considered and resolved. ## What is coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19)?

Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) is a respiratory illness that can spread from person to person. The virus that causes COVID-19 is a novel coronavirus that was first identified during an investigation into an outbreak in Wuhan, China.

## Can people in the U.S. get COVID-19?

Yes. COVID-19 is spreading from person to person in parts of the United States. Risk of infection with COVID-19 is higher for people who are close contacts of someone known to have COVID-19, for example healthcare workers, or household members. Other people at higher risk for infection are those who live in or have recently been in an area with ongoing spread of COVID-19. ## Have there been cases of COVID-19 in the U.S.?

Yes. The first case of COVID-19 in the United States was reported on January 21, 2020. The current count of cases of COVID-19 in the United States is available on CDC's webpage at <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/cases-in-us.html>.

## How does COVID-19 spread?

The virus that causes COVID-19 probably emerged from an animal source, but is now spreading from person to person. The virus is thought to spread mainly between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet) through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes. It also may be possible that a person can get COVID-19 by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose, or possibly their eyes, but this is not thought to be the main way the virus spreads. ## What are the symptoms of COVID-19?

Patients with COVID-19 have had mild to severe respiratory illness with symptoms of

- fever
- cough
- shortness of breath

## What are severe complications from this virus?

Some patients have pneumonia in both lungs, multi-organ failure and in some cases death.

## How can I help protect myself?

People can help protect themselves from respiratory illness with everyday preventive actions.

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available.

## If you are sick, to keep from spreading respiratory illness to others, you should

- Stay home when you are sick.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.

## What should I do if I recently traveled from an area with ongoing spread of COVID-19?

If you have traveled from an affected area, there may be restrictions on your movements for up to 2 weeks. If you develop symptoms during that period (fever, cough, trouble breathing), seek medical advice. Call the office of your health care provider before you go, and tell them about your travel and your symptoms. They will give you instructions on how to get care without exposing other people to your illness. While sick, avoid contact with people, don't go out and delay any travel to reduce the possibility of spreading illness to others.

## Is there a vaccine?

There is currently no vaccine to protect against COVID-19. The best way to prevent infection is to take everyday preventive actions, like avoiding close contact with people who are sick and washing your hands often.

## Is there a treatment?

There is no specific antiviral treatment for COVID-19. People with COVID-19 can seek medical care to help relieve symptoms.

## ***National Recreation and Park Association Joint Statement on Using Parks and Open Space While Maintaining Social Distancing (March 18, 2020)***

The National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) prepared the following statement to support the power of parks and open spaces as essential resources for health and wellness during the COVID-19 outbreak. To date, more than 500 organizations have signed on to voice support.

Concerns about the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) outbreak continue to grip our nation. As organizations that support the power of parks and open spaces as essential resources for health and wellness, we understand that people may have questions and concerns about visiting their local parks, trails or open spaces at this time.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has flagged mental health as a top concern associated with the COVID-19 outbreak. We recognize that social distancing may take a toll on our mental health, especially during high-stress and anxiety-producing global public health emergencies. We also know that parks provide a connection to the outdoors and green space as well as opportunities for physical activity which studies demonstrate reduces stress and improves mental health.

We believe that many parks, trails and open spaces can continue to be used in a safe manner that allows people to enjoy the mental and physical health benefits these spaces provide. In all instances, we recommend people follow local, state and national ordinances and guidelines regarding the use of these spaces and recognize that these vary from community to community.


In places where there are no restrictions on the use of local parks, trails and open spaces, we encourage all users to follow these recommendations:

- Refrain from using parks or trails if they are exhibiting symptoms.
- Follow CDC's guidance on personal hygiene prior to and during use of parks or trails.
- Prepare for limited access to public restrooms or water fountains.
- While on trails, warn other users of their presence and as they pass, and step aside to let others pass.
- Follow CDC guidance on the recommended size of social gatherings including outdoor picnicking, pick-up sports and other group hangouts, and maintain proper physical distance at all times.
- Observe CDC's minimum recommended social distancing of 6 feet from other individuals at all times. If this is not possible, users should find an alternate location or depart that space.
- Consult their local and state ordinances and guidelines for the most up to date recommendations on park and trail use.

We encourage local jurisdictions to keep parks, trails and open spaces accessible as long as it is safe to do so.

Our local parks, trails and open spaces have always served as places where people can find respite and seek peace and restoration. During this time of uncertainty, these places are needed now more than ever. Our nation's park and recreation professionals are working hard to maintain these spaces and keep them safe, accessible and benefiting our communities during these challenging times. Let us all do our part to use them in a way that respects each other and public health guidance.





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## Ford County issues disaster declaration

On March 19, at the Government Center in Dodge City, the Ford County Board of County Commissioners held a special meeting to decide whether to issue a disaster declaration for Ford County in lieu of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The motion was to put to vote because of the wide influence and affect that COVID-19 has had on the country so far, making the Board of County Commissioners consider it an “imminent threat” to Ford County.

The motion passed with a 3-0 vote.

The disaster declaration falls under the statutes recognized by the board and states that:

- A state of local disaster emergency exists.
- That it covers the entire vicinity of Ford County.
- This protocol will activate all response and recovery aspects of any and all emergency plans applicable to Ford County.
- The Board of County Commissioners will retain all rights and powers to perform emergency acts, as stated by and through the provisions of the Kansas Emergency Preparedness Act of 1975.
- That it will be recognized as in affect for a total of 14 days unless terminated or renewed by the board.

A motion was carried during the meeting to change the days of operation from 14 days to 60 days, to match the governor’s recent proclamation.

“I’ve been continuing to research about this and I have to say that we as a state, we as a nation have gone over the top a little about responding to this,” said 1st District Commissioner Shawn Tasset. “The more I read about it and come to understand how it spreads and that it happens exponentially, the math about it, has really opened my eyes a little bit.”

Tasset believes that more stringent measures of action are necessary.

Commissioner Ken Snook, who represents the 3rd District, followed by stating that he believed that ideas could be found among the community.

With the motion passed, all in-person services, provided by Ford County facilities will cease and only essential personnel will be allowed access to those facilities.

All non-essential county services will cease operation and those personnel will be put on paid-administrative leave, all of this falling in line with the disaster declaration.

It is being left up to the Ford County department heads to determine what will be considered nonessential.

County services will continue through online and telecommunication availability.

Tasset said they are still going to be adapting to the new change in processes as they figure them out, while calling it a “proactive move” and saying that while Ford County is stepping into drastic territory, it is important to not panic.

“This is a process we’re going to grow through and we’re literally going to set the curve, probably, for the nation,” said county administrator J.D. Gilbert. “I mean most people are just restricting access or some services, not completely shutting down.

“Of course, we’re not talking about Fire and EMS, law enforcement and communications, that’s not what we’re talking about, those are essential services.”

A meeting to revisit this vote will take place on March 30.

## **STUDENTS COMPETE FOR CASH PRIZES AT THE FORD COUNTY YOUTH ENTREPRENEURSHIP COMPETITION**

*Dodge City KS* – Seventeen students presented their business concepts on Wednesday, March 11<sup>th</sup>, 2020 at the Fourth Annual Youth Entrepreneurship Competition (YEC). YEC is hosted by the Dodge City/Ford County Development Corporation and was held at the Dodge City Community College. Students were scored on their executive summary and four-minute presentation by a panel of local judges. This local entrepreneurship competition is part of the YEC series by NetWork Kansas. The winner of the local competition will go on to compete at the state competition on April 28<sup>th</sup> at Kansas State University.

Lauren Seachris won first place and \$1,500 with her business Laurens Treats. Lauren who is a young entrepreneur actually does this as a business. She sells her homemade pet treats and toys online and at regional trade shows. Second place winner, Camila Gonzalez won \$1,000 with her business Garage Lodge and Ty Vilaysing with Ace Detailing won third place and \$500. Camila's business Garage Lodge is a business concept she thought of when she was young. Garage Lodge is a garage located on interstate exits which provide a secure place for people to sleep in their vehicles for a low rate. "Garage Lodge ensures sleep to all people on the move because; your rest is our only quest" is the mission of Garage Lodge. Ty's business concept Ace Detailing provides mobile auto detailing and focuses on providing the convenience of coming to the customer.

The goal of the competition is to expose students to entrepreneurship. "All the students did an excellent job presenting their business ideas." said Mollea Wainscott, Special Projects Coordinator for the Dodge City/Ford County Development Corporation. "It is really amazing to see our youth think like entrepreneurs, they put a lot of time and work into their business plans." This event was sponsored by SMH Consulting and Chris Boys – American Family Insurance. Many community members support this event by sponsoring, judging, presenting and mentoring the students.
